**Subject: - Grant of conditional permission to Jupiter Ayurved Medical College and Tarini Ayurved Hospital Shankarpur, Nagpur, -441108 Maharashtra (Inst. Id AYU0186) with intake capacity of 35 seats (instead of 40 seats) in UG (BAMS) course for the academic session 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 and issuance of denial of permission for increase intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25, under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant regulations there under.**

Sir/Madam,

With reference to the subject mentioned above, I am directed to inform you that in pursuance of the provision of National commission for Indian System of Medicine Act, 2020, the Indian Medicine Central Council Act, 1970 (48 of 1970) has been repealed with effect from the 11<sup>th</sup> day of June, 2021. With effect from the said date, the Central Council of Indian Medicine constituted under sub-division (1) of section 3 of the Indian Medicine Central Council Act, 1970 (48 of 1970) shall stand dissolved. Now, in exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (3) of the section 1 of the said Act, the Central Government hereby notifies that all the provisions of the National Commission for Indian System of Medicine Act, 2020 has been come into force with effect from the 11th day of June, 2021.

1. I am to refer to your application vide ref. no. Ref. No. GSS/JAMC/608/2023 dated 28.08.2023 and revised application/scheme vide reference no. GSS/JAMC/871/2023 dated 08.12.2023, on the subject cited above and to verify the available facilities of teaching, non-teaching, hospital staff and other facilities available at your college namely Jupiter Ayurved Medical College and Tarini Ayurved Hospital Shankarpur, Nagpur, -441108 Maharashtra (Inst. Id AYU0186) for the issuance of Letter of permission for increase intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25 under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020.
2. In view of above, as per the decision taken in the 76<sup>th</sup> Board meeting of Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine, NCISM held on 02.01.2024, Letter of Intent (LOI) was issued to you for increase of seats in existing UG (BAMS) course from 40 seats to 60 seats under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020 from the academic session 2024-25 on the basis of Conditional permission for intake capacity of 40 seats in the Academic Year 2023-24 vide letter of even no. dated 04.01.2024.
3. Further, Medical Assessment and Rating Board (NCISM) carried out inspection of your College on 29.02.2024 & 01.03.2024 and again visited on 18.03.2024 and 19.03.2024 via Hybrid mode as a part of annual visitation by the visitation team of Medical Assessment and Rating Board, NCISM to process for the issuance of conditional permission with intake capacity of 40 seats in UG (BAMS) course for the academic session 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 and issuance of Letter of permission for increase intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25 under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant regulations there under.
4. Further, in view of above, the visitation report and all other related documents were assessed in terms of enforced regulation namely, the "the Establishment of New Medical College, Opening of New or Higher Course of Study or Training and Increase of Admission Capacity by a Medical College Regulations, 2019, "Indian Medicine Central Council (Requirements of Minimum Standard for under-graduate Ayurveda Colleges and attached Hospitals) Regulations, 2016" and provisions under the NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant Regulations there under. On examining the case in light of above notified and approved criteria and on perusal of the visitation report, it was observed that the college was not fulfilling the basic eligibility criteria due to following shortcomings: -

a) Availability of teaching staff for the issuance of conditional permission with intake capacity of 40 seats in UG (BAMS) course is  $\frac{\text{Available}}{\text{Required}} \times 100\% = \frac{26}{30} \times 100 = 86.66\%$ .

**b) Functionality of the hospital –**

- Total number of **patients attended** OPD from 1st Jan 2023 to 31st Dec. 2023 is **33349.00** and shortcoming is **2651.**
- Average attendance of patient in OPD per day is **111.16** and **shortcoming is 8.83667.**
- Number of **deliveries conducted** from 1st Jan 2023 to 31st Dec. 2023 is **00.**

**c) Observations by the visitor:-**

- The central registration system is not web based. There is central registration system in the reception of the hospital. Computers were found in OPD's but were not connected to internet & the details of patients attending the OPD's like prescription, lab investigations advised, etc are not entered in computerized central registration system.
  - The hospital IPD infrastructure is poor & requires severe repairing. The beds, cots & other linen were very dirty, unhygienic and very old.
  - No attached toilet in the Prasuti & Stri Roga OPD.
  - There was no manufacturing date/ expiry date on the medicines kept for dispensing in the pharmacy procured from teaching pharmacy of college.
  - Principal office of Tarini Pharmacy College is found in the ground floor academic block.
  - No PUC is produced by the college for college/hospital.
  - No fire NOC is shown by the college.
5. In view of above, the assessment report was placed in the **98<sup>th</sup> Board meeting** of Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine (NCISM) held on **19.07.2024**. On careful examination of the assessment report, considering the deficiencies observed therein as mentioned above the college was given an opportunity of virtual hearing vide the MARBISM letter (Hearing notice) of **even no. dated 26.07.2024** to appear on **30.07.2024** before the designated Hearing Committee to present their case and to show cause as to **why not the Conditional Permission for intake capacity of 40 seats in UG (BAMS) course and letter of permission for increase in intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25, under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020 be denied.**
6. The college was directed to make written submission in respect of the case and produce all relevant valid documents/records/proof against all the deficiencies/shortcomings as indicated above. The representatives of the college submitted written submissions **vide ref. no. GSS/JAMC/602/2024 dated 29.07.2024** against the deficiencies conveyed to them. Whereas, the college through its representatives, **Dr. Sunder singh Dage, Principal and Mrs. Tarini Khare, Management of the college** appeared before the Hearing Committee on **30.07.2024** and made their submission virtually as well as written submission against the shortcomings communicated to the college. The shortcomings communicated to the college, submission made by the representatives of the Ayurveda college and observations made by the Hearing Committee are as under:-

Further we have also conducted MUHS GSS/JAMC/224/2024 dated 20.03.2024 same recruitment process with vide letter no advertisement also given in national level newspaper Lokasatta on 20.03.2024. **Dr. Shashank Choudhary (AYKS00896)** has been appointed on 30.12.2023 as Assistant Professor in dept of Kriya Shareer, his appointment and joining letter attached herewith. Further Dr.Smita Kukudkar is also working as a Assistant Professor since 05 June 2024, her teacher code is AYKS00908. He is verified by NCISM visitors also during visitation (attached Annexure-III & NCISM ANNEXURE-1)

Our Institution has already published for the post of Associate Professor in Agad tantra department by advertisement in Lokasatta and Indian express on dated 19.04.2023 subsequently also given advertisement with letter no. GSS/JAMC/899/2023 dated on 15.12.2023 and next advertisement wide letter no GSS/JAMC/443/2024 dated on 22.05.2024. Further we have also conducted MUHS GSS/JAMC/224/2024 dated 20.03.2024 same advertisement also given in national level newspaper Lokasatta on 20.03.2024. However, in spite of hard effort by institution as well as university there were no candidate was available for appointment on this post of Associate Professor hence this post was vacant. However, institute will advertise it again and try to fill up this post as early as possible. (attached Annexure-II).

Our Institution has ready published advertisement in for the post associate Professor in Shalakyia in Loksatta and Indian express on dated 19.04.2023 subsequently also given advertisement with letter no. GSS/JAMC/899/2023 dated on 15.12.2023 and next advertisement with letter no GSS/JAMC/443/2024 dated on 22.05.2024. Further we have also

- In the department of Kriya Sharir there was shortcoming of 1 LF, At the time of hearing the principal stated that, Dr. Shashank Choudhary (AYKS00896) has been appointed on 30.12.2023 as Assistant Professor in dept of Kriya Shareer, his appointment and joining letter attached in submission. At the time of hearing committee has verified in OTMS and teacher was not updated in OTMS or linked with the college.

**Hence, submission cannot be considered. Shortcoming still persists.**

- In the department of Agad Tantra 1HF and in the department of Shalakyia Tantra 1 HF was shortcoming. At the time of hearing Principal stated that there was no HF in the department of Agad tantra and Shalakyia Tantra.

**Availability of total Teaching staff is  $\frac{26}{30} \times 100 = 86.66\%$ .**

**Hence submission cannot be considered and shortcoming still persists.**

However, due to certain external factors beyond our control, we have faced challenges in fulfilling the daily OPD patient attendance criteria. However, our last three-year total patients are as follows-</b></p> <p><b>No. of OPD (Out Patients Department) Patients in 2020 = 24490</b></p> <p><b>No. of OPD (Out Patients Department) Patients in 2021 = 23684</b></p> <p><b>No. of OPD (Out Patients Department) Patients in 2022 = 24086</b></p> <p><b>No. of OPD (Out Patients Department) Patients in 2023 = 33449 (which is increased by 1.38 time than previous year)</b></p> <p><b>Further, we are continuously trying to improve service for OPD patients by conductive various activities like health diagnostic camps, Shibir, health melas in order to increase the OPD. Thats why slightly shortcoming in OPD attendance observed by visitors is 8.83 per day, so it is kindly requested to consider this shortcoming.</b></p> <p><b>1. Peripheral Location:</b> Our hospital is situated in a peripheral region, which inherently limits the number of patients we can attract compared to centrally located hospitals. The accessibility issues and longer travel distances deter many potential patients from seeking our services, leading to a Lower daily OPD attendance.</p> <p><b>2. Competition from Newly Established Private Hospitals</b> The vicinity of our college has seen a surge in newly established private hospitals. These institutions, with their aggressive marketing strategies and modern facilities, have diverted a significant portion of the patient population that would otherwise have sought treatment at our hospital in low cost. This increased competition has had a notable impact on our patient numbers in OPD.</p> <p><b>3. Presence of AIIMS-like Institution</b></p>	<p>2. Functionality of the hospital –</p> <p>i. The presence of AIIMS-like institutions in close proximity to our hospital has further compounded the issue. These institutions are highly reputed and attract a large number of patients due to their advanced medical infrastructures and comprehensive healthcare services including AYUSH OPD. Consequently, many patients prefer these institutions over smaller hospitals like ours, leading to a slight shortfall in our OPD attendance.

**4. Strategies for Improvement:**

Despite these challenges, we are actively working on strategies to improve our OPD/IPD attendance. These include:

• **Enhanced Community Outreach: Conducting health camps, awareness programs, and**

Community engagement activities to attract more patients in periphery of hospital.

• **Collaboration with Local Clinics:**

Partnering with local clinics and healthcare providers

to refer patients to our hospital for specialized treatments.

• **Upgrading Facilities:**

Continuously upgrading our medical facilities and services to match the standards of nearby competitors. While we acknowledge the importance of meeting the NCIMS MSR 2024 criteria, the aforementioned factors have significantly impacted our ability to do so. We request consideration and understanding of these challenges and are committed to implementing measures to enhance our patient attendance in the future. Following clarification provided

for remaining points- We have daily OPD service for women patient for all routine care during ANC by Stree Rega and Prasuti (Total patients were 3631 in 2023) which is satisfactory, however due to existence of govt dispensaries, PHC's and AIIMS like institution in the vicinity of college hospital, most of patients prefer these hospitals for delivery as Govt is providing financial supports and incentives to the ANC patients for delivery and family planning too., hence these patients prefer govt institution for the deliveries rather private institution hospital.

**3. Observations by the visitor:-**

- i. The central registration system is not web based. There is central registration system in the reception of the hospital. Computers were found in OPD's but were not connected to internet & the details of patients attending the OPD's like prescription, lab investigations advised, etc are not entered in computerized central registration system.

7. The observation of hearing committee based on the submission made by the college representatives during hearing and assessment report of the NCISM have been carefully re-examined in terms of Regulation 3 of the "Indian Medicine Central Council (Requirements of Minimum Standard for under-graduate Ayurveda Colleges and attached Hospitals) Regulations, 2016", and provisions under the NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant regulations there under, and the recommendation of Hearing Committee was placed in the **100<sup>th</sup> Board meeting** of Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine (NCISM) **held on 01.08.2024.**

8. Whereas, in view of the aforementioned shortcoming and deficiencies and as per the observation of Hearing Committee based on the submission made by the college representatives during hearing and assessment report has been carefully examined in terms of concerned Regulation and provisions under the NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant regulations thereunder and it is found that the **college is fulfilling the basic eligibility criteria for issuance of conditional permission with 40 seats in UG (BAMS) course for the academic session 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 but not fulfilling the basic eligibility criteria for issuance of letter of permission for increase in intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25, under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020. However, Board decided to issue conditional permission with 40 seats in UG (BAMS) course, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 as per the approved Seat Reduction Policy in accordance of Section 28 (1) (f) of NCISM Act 2020 for failing to maintain the minimum essential standards for the Academic year 2024-25**

**As per the seat reduction policy:-**

a) **"For deficiency of every one teacher, seat reduction in the intake capacity shall be considered by reducing the intake strength by 10 % of total intake capacity."**

Accordingly as per Schedule-V Note (iii) of MSR 2016 the deficiency of teacher for up to sixty intake capacity shall not exceed more than ten percent of total requirement. As per the Hearing Committee observation and approval of Minutes in the 100<sup>th</sup> Board meeting of MARBISM, college is having only 26 total eligible Teaching faculties.

There is deficiency of 01 teacher for issuance of conditional Permission for academic session 2024-25 as per Schedule-V Note (iii) of MSR 2016. **Therefore, in accordance of seat reduction policy 2024-25, for deficiency of one teacher, seat reduction in the intake capacity shall be considered by reducing the intake strength by 10% of total intake capacity.**

**Further, in accordance of Seat Reduction policy 2024-2025, seat reduction in the intake capacity shall be considered by reducing four (04) seats of the total intake capacity**

- b) **"For every 10% deficiency in Average attendance of patients in OPD per day seat reduction in the intake capacity shall be considered by reducing the intake strength by one seat."**

As per the assessment report and clarification submitted by the college, the Average attendance of patient in OPD per day is **111.16** with shortcoming of **8.84** which is rounded off to 10 in average attendances of patients. **Therefore, in accordance of seat reduction policy 2024-25, seat reduction in the intake capacity shall be considered by reducing one seat of the total intake capacity.**

**Therefore, after applying the seat Reduction Policy, college is fulfilling the basic eligibility criteria for issuance of conditional permission with 35 seats (instead of 40 seats) in UG (BAMS) course for the academic session 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020.**

Accordingly, after applying the seat reduction policy 2024-25 under section 28 (1) (f) of NCISM Act 2020, college is fulfilling the basic eligibility criteria for issuance of **conditional with 35 seats (instead of 40 seats) in UG (BAMS) course for the academic session 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020.**

**Further, the college is not fulfilling the eligibility criteria for the issuance of Letter of Permission to increase the intake capacity from 40 seats to 60 seats in UG (BAMS) course from the academic session 2024-25 due to failure, to maintain the minimum essential standards as per regulation 3 (3) and Note-iii of Schedule-V, of MSR 2016 for conditional permission with existing 40 Seats in UG BAMS Course for the academic session 2024-25 under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020.**

**In addition, as per the regulation 70.(1) (b) of MES (Assessment & Rating for undergraduate Ayurveda Colleges and Attached Teaching Hospitals) Regulations, 2024 under Chapter IX, with regard to eligibility of fully established Colleges applying for seat increase, it is stated that a college that has not been subjected to the provisions of clause (f) of sub-section (1) of section 28 of the Act, for the preceding five years including the year of application, is eligible.** Accordingly, the college is not fulfilling the eligibility criteria for granting seat increase in intake capacity as the college is subjected to seat reduction as mentioned under **clause (f) of sub-section (1) of section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 for the academic year 2024-25.**

9. Therefore, in view of shortcomings and deficiencies mentioned as above, conditional permission is being granted to Jupiter Ayurved Medical College and Tarini Ayurved Hospital Shankarpur, Nagpur, -441108 Maharashtra (Inst. Id AYU0186) with **35 seats (instead of 40 seats) in UG (BAMS) course for the academic year 2024-25, under section 28 of NCISM Act, 2020 and Denial of letter of permission for increase in intake capacity in existing UG (BAMS) Course from 40 seats to 60 seats from the academic session 2024-25, under section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant regulations thereunder.**
- I. The college shall submit an undertaking in the form of affidavit duly notarized within one month explaining the details of providing EPF and ESI facilities to the teaching, non-teaching staff of the Colleges/Hospitals and regularly paying the same as per the provisions of Employees' Provident Funds and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 & ESI Act, 1948 and relevant Rules and Regulations.
- II. It is further inform that minimum **15% of undergraduate seats of the permitted intake capacity with 35 seats (instead of 40 seats)** shall be treated as all India quota. The counseling for seats under all India quota shall be conducted by respective counseling authority as designated by Central Government for A.Y. 2024-25 and counseling for the remaining 85% seats or as the case may be, shall be conducted by the concerned Counseling Authority of that State/UT. **The permission of the college stands withdrawn if the college fails to comply with the aforesaid direction of the Central Government/NCISM for all India quota or the students admitted thereunder.**
- III. It is also informed that determination of fee and all other charges in respect of 50% of seats in private Medical Institutions and deemed to be University should be as per the guidelines issued by NCISM vide ref no. BUSS/Fee/ASU/2022-23 dated 16.09.2022. Fees of the remaining 50% of seats are to be fixed as per the guidelines of Fee Fixation/Regulatory Committee (FRC) of respective State/UT/Deemed to be University.
10. Admissions made in violation of the above conditions will be treated as invalid and action will be initiated under NCISM Act & Regulations thereunder.
11. Further, **as per Sub-section (7) of Section 29 of NCISM Act, 2020**, The Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine may conduct evaluation and assessment of any University or medical institution at any time, either directly or through any other expert, having integrity and experience in medical profession, without any prior notice and assess and evaluate the performance, standards and benchmarks of

such University or medical institution and if the college is found to be not maintaining the Minimum Essential standards as specified in the concerned Acts & Regulations then **in accordance of Section 28 (1) (f) of NCISM Act, 2020 the issued permission of the college shall deemed to be withdrawn and denial of permission shall be issued by MARBISM for stoppage of admission for that particular academic year or the subsequent year.**

12. Discrepancies, if any, may be immediately brought to the notice of Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine, NCISM.
13. **The following requirements should be fulfilled by the college by 31st December, 2024 and send a compliance report to get permission for the academic session 2025-26:**
  - i) All the requirements under the provisions of the NCISM Act, 2020 and relevant Regulations made thereunder should be fulfilled.
  - ii) All the requirements of Minimum Standard of infrastructure and teaching & training facilities as specified in NCISM (Minimum essential standards, assessment and rating for undergraduate Ayurveda colleges and attached teaching hospitals) Regulations, 2024.
  - iii) All the requirements of the National Commission for Indian System of Medicine (Minimum Standards of Undergraduate Ayurveda Education) Regulations-2022.
  - iv) All the requirements of the Indian Medicine Central Council (Post Graduate Ayurveda Education) Regulations, 2016;
  - v) The shortcoming mentioned in Para no. 5.
14. The fulfillment of the conditions given above may be made within the time period specified and compliance report should be submitted by the college to President, Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine. The Medical Assessment and Rating Board for Indian System of Medicine will verify that the conditions have been fulfilled for considering the permission for the academic session 2025-26.
